***From the President:***

Thanks to the generous support of our donors, in April the Scholarship Committee awarded \$119,000 of financial aid to 41 young adults with cystic fibrosis. Our scholarship recipients will attend a variety of community colleges, state universities, and private colleges, as well as vocational training. Though these young people have achieved so much, they are still in great need of our financial support, and just knowing that there are people—and strangers, at that—willing to help them obtain an education means so much to them. Your support helps them not only accomplish their goals, but deepens their sense of community, and further enkindles both their and our faith in the generosity of others. With these awards, CFSF has now awarded over \$1.6 million in scholarships to 850 deserving young adults with cystic fibrosis.

A special thanks to all of our great supporters who raise funds in memory of those who have lost their battle to cystic fibrosis. Over the years the Kevin Tidwell Foundation has provided numerous students with an opportunity to pursue their dreams of a further education. In 2005, the Foundation funded its first scholarship, The Kevin Tidwell Memorial Scholarship for \$10,000 over 4 years. They have continued this important scholarship every year since 2005. In addition, in 2008 they began funding the Glen Parsons Memorial Scholarship. Glen had been involved in the Kevin Tidwell Foundation for many years. After his passing, the foundation wanted to recognize his contributions and efforts on behalf of the Foundation. This is also a \$10,000 scholarship over 4 years. Since 2005, The Kevin Tidwell Foundation has funded \$210,000 of scholarships for CFSF. In future newsletters, we will highlight more of these generous groups that have played such an important part in the success of CFSF.

A year ago the Food and Drug Administration approved a new drug, Orkambi, that can impact over 50% of those with CF. This drug is the first for this group of CF patients to target the underlying cause of CF. It also makes me aware of how important our work is for those young adults struggling with this disease, as their chances for a long, rich future are increasing every minute.

I wish to express my appreciation for all of those who have helped our young adults with CF pursue their dreams during the past seventeen years, and I know I am joined in this by all of the recipients of the CFSF awards. Enjoy reading about one of the recent graduates who received a scholarship for the past four years as well as two new recipients.

### ***2016 Tim and Ritch Dangel Scholarship Winner***

As a fifth generation Alaskan I have grown up living in the land of mountains, lakes and wildlife. I am the youngest of three children, and the second of my parents' children to be diagnosed with Cystic Fibrosis. My eldest brother, Zachary, who was born nine years before me, was first diagnosed with CF after birth. By the time I was born, they knew how to handle the daily tasks of administering medication, constant doctor's visits, and illnesses, but as any parent who has raised a child with a chronic illness will know, every day brings new and terrifying challenges. My eldest brother passed away in the fall of 2006 only a week shy of his 19<sup>th</sup> birthday after a life-long battle with his disease. Growing up with his legacy behind me has shaped the way I prioritize aspects of my life; my health, my family and my education come before anything else.



In my education life, I had the good fortune to attend the Aurora Waldorf School in my hometown of Anchorage, and after that Polaris K-12 School, an open-optional program that emphasized values of creativity, self-directed learning and community. Growing up with excellent emotional support for my health and education both at home and at school was indelible in allowing me to flourish as a teenager-at a time in my life where managing CF became a struggle for my brother. The support team at my local CF center is world-class, and I owe my state of wellbeing to them as much as my family. It is due in part to their support, and to the support of this scholarship, that I am able to realize my dreams of achieving a higher education. For so many with CF, daily life is a constant struggle just to draw breath. To know that there is an educational foundation willing to support my educational pursuits is invaluable.

My whole life I have had a passion for creative writing, sociology and English literature, and it is my desire to pursue these endeavors at the university level and beyond. Thanks for making a difference in my life and the lives of many others.

## ***Kristen Cash Graduate of the Class of 2016 at University of Florida***

It is difficult for me to believe that I have come to the end of my undergraduate career at the University of Florida. To say that I kept busy over the last four years would be an understatement. I majored in political science and philosophy while also pursuing a minor in nonprofit organizational leadership. Aside from my studies I was always very involved both on campus and in the community. I have served as an executive board member with Phi Alpha Delta, the international pre law co-ed fraternity. I was a choreographer and the president of UF's performance tap team, "Stomp the Swamp" and I was a representative for UF at the national College Youth in Government convention. I was selected as a UF student ambassador as part of the "Gator for a Day" program providing tours and information to future UF students. I am a member of the University of Florida's Honors Program, Golden Key Honor Society, Phi Kappa Phi Honor society, and I am a UF Anderson Scholar, which is awarded to the top 5% of University of Florida students based on GPA. I was honored to have been named one of the top 8 finalists for the University of Florida's Woman leader of the year award. I was an intern for a State Representative, a county Judge, and UF Health Shands Hospital. I was also able to do research and write a senior honors thesis, one of only five in my department. I have learned that with hard work you really can accomplish anything.

My undergraduate college career has come to a close. However, my time as a student is not quite over, as I will be attending law school in the fall. I was accepted into and received academic scholarship offers from many wonderful law schools including Vanderbilt University Law School, Emory University Law School, Wake Forrester University School of Law, and the University of Florida's Levin College of Law. After much deliberation I will be attending the University Of Florida Levin College Of Law with an 80.4% merit based scholarship. Tim and Ritch were brothers who both had CF. Tim died in 2001 at the age of 33 and Ritch passed away in 2006 at the age of 36. Tim worked as an architect in Cincinnati and Celina. He was waiting for a lung transplant at the time of his death. Ritch died from a rare liver disorder. At the time of his death he was the senior project manager for Messer in Dayton, Ohio. Ritch loved boating and water sports and was an accomplished "barefoot" water skier. Tim and Ritch never let cystic fibrosis keep them from living life to the fullest. Their family organizes this event in memory of the brothers and the proceeds are then awarded to one student each year.
